

INTRODUCTION

As much as everybody likes to see "old friends," it is still a treat to see "new faces." In the exhibition, "150 Years of Portraiture in Western New York," there is opportunity to see old and new friends; people that were and are part of the great heritage of Western New York in the last century and a half. As you wander through the galleries you will stroll through time. You will meet such personalities as Sheldon Thompson, the first elected mayor of Buffalo (1840); Joseph Ellicott, who surveyed and laid out the village of Buffalo; Corbet Sundown, a 20th century Seneca chief; Captain Joseph Josephs, an early Republican booster; and many more, all individuals from various walks of life that make up the unique area of Buffalo and Western New York.

The vast amount of Western New York portraiture done in the last 150 years is as rich and varied as any in the country. From the traveling itinerant 19th century painter who passed through this area advertising his trade, (no, they did not paint the bodies first and the heads later on), to the trained academician like Edmund Tarbell of the later 19th century, to the 20th century contemporary artist, there is an extensive and colorful group of objects from which to choose. In fact, it is so extensive that the tracking committee that chose the objects for the exhibition had to turn away good items because of space limitations, condition, etc. The final selections were based on quality, aesthetics, variety, condition, and importance of the sitter or the artist and the story told. I feel the paintings, sculpture, and photographs not only represent a sampling of our artistic achievement of Western New York, but also a valuable commentary on our social history.

Color relationship, interesting design and likeness of the sitter are all necessary ingredients of a successful portrait. The tracking committee has tried to choose artworks that have a certain look, a style, a dynamics, an actual insight into the individual. A seriousness can be seen in the portraits of Joseph Ellicott, Judge Sears, Clergyman William D. Walker, and General Peter B. Porter which is a reflection of the times when they were painted. Charles Hawthorne, known for his paintings of Cape Cod fishermen, has painted the four children of Dr. John Hill in a rather melancholy mood. His solidly modelled subjects are often in a pensive mood or have a look of inner sadness. The portrait of Col. Peter A. Porter, son of Gen. Porter, is painted with great verve and a sense of history, the vertical structure of the American flag covering over one-third of the canvas. Although the artist is unknown, the picture is an important historical document of the Civil War period. The portrait of James Wadsworth of Geneseo, attributed to John Trumbull, introduces us to a practical man who made things happen. He was a planner and developer, a settler and an educator. Pose, as dictated by the artist, is also important to the final structure of a picture: for example, full-standing presentation often indicates status. Edmund Tarbell's "Franklin Locke," circa 1915, is an impressive example of society portraiture with the full figure bathed in a muted darkness. Mrs. William H. Gratwick, Jr. of Pavilion. New York and Buffalo was a lady who, both consciously and unconsciously, always made an entrance. Sorolla's 1910 painting captures this quality. American painting became filled with light after 1900 due to the influence of the Impressionists; their trend is reflected in Evelyn Rumsey Lord's "Woman with Parasol." The subject is immersed in clear, afternoon sunlight, and the fluid handling of paint is reminiscent of the American "Ten" who influenced Lord's style. The age-old theme of mother and child takes on new meaning with Virginia E. Tillou's "Amy and Her Mother." The bright palette and strong composition coupled with a natural, almost off-handed pose makes this a fine example of contemporary portraiture.

The self-taught folk painters of the 19th century with their innate sense of color and design left us an important record of portraits of our early families. That several talented naive artists found their way to Western New York during the period 1820-50 is not surprising. The charming picture of William Fiske, c. 1840, with his pet dog, red drape, and vari-colored Turkish carpet is a fine example of composite folk portraiture done in this area. The question of folk art versus academic art and its merits takes on less meaning when confronted with such a painting.

This exhibition has a few small surprises. The five paintings by Madame Shoumatoff, a Russian-born artist working in America in the 1920's and 30's, are little gems. The clarity and detail of these small scale paintings are hard to believe. Annie Crawford, a little known but excellent Buffalo artist, chose an unusual subject. "The Bride" has a religious aura about it and is one of the small treasures owned by the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society. A cast bronze relief by the great Augustus St. Gaudens of Dr. Walter Cary is beautifully modelled. Although small in scale, it is a very powerful piece.

Nothing is more interesting than people... or portraits of people, and with this exhibition we have tried to bring together a cross section of Western New York citizens from various walks of life. At one time or another, the artists have lived in this area or passed through it, leaving us a rich, artistic heritage. The styles and techniques in the works are different, but the end result of each portrait is a faithful expressive likeness, bequeathed to future generations. The people of Western New York should be proud of their artistic heritage: enjoy it; preserve it; learn from it.

Dana E. Tillou Guest Curator Catalog entries appear in alphabetical order by the artist. Measurements are in inches, height precedes width precedes depth. Lenders are noted after descriptive statistics of the works.

1. WALTER CARY AS A BOY, c. 1830 ANONYMOUS Oil on wood panel, 28 x 21 Private collection

Dr. Cary (1818-81), Buffalo physician and world traveller, included his family in annual European tours. Father of George Cary, architect.

2. PRESIDENT AND MRS. GROVER CLEVELAND, 1893 ANONYMOUS

Silk, 7 x 5 each

Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society

Stephen Grover Cleveland (1837-1908) served nonconsecutive terms as 22nd and 24th President of the U.S. Born in NJ, raised and educated in WNY, and settled in Buffalo. A lawyer, he wore many hats during his political life: Assistant District Attorney of Erie County 1863-65; Sheriff of Erie County 1871-73; Mayor of Buffalo 1882-3; Governor of NY 1883-85. His first term as President, 1885-89, was followed by defeat to Benjamin Harrison. Cleveland returned to his law practice and won the Presidential election in 1892 for a second term 1893-97. Mrs. Cleveland, Frances Folsom (1864-1947) was born and raised in Buffalo. They are the only President and wife to have been married in the White House, June 2, 1886. They had three daughters and two sons. These silk portraits were woven at the World's Columbian Exposition, Chicago in 1893.

3. PORTRAIT OF DeWITT CLINTON, c. 1828 ANONYMOUS (Attributed to R. Palmer) Oil on wood panel, 28 x 24 The Buffalo Club

DeWitt Clinton was responsible for the Erie Canal which led to the rapid growth of WNY after 1825. Twice Governor of NY, 1817-22 and 1824-26. Possibly painted by R. Palmer, a Rochester-Auburn area artist.

4. DAVID ELLICOTT EVANS, c. 1830 ANONYMOUS (Attributed to Ezra Ames) Oil on wood, 28½ x 25 Thomas D. Mahoney

At age 15, David Ellicott Evans (1788-1850) left his home in Maryland and came to WNY with his uncle, Joseph Ellicott (see entry 137). Elected to State Senate in 1822, he later became resident agent for the Holland Land Company, for which he sold more than half the lands owned by the company.

5. FRANK W. FISKE, c. 1836-38 ANONYMOUS Oil on canvas backed by board, 48 x 36 Mr. and Mrs. John L. Surdam

Frank Fiske, from one of Buffalo's first families, is shown as a young boy. The painting was lent by his granddaughter, Mrs. John L. Surdam.

6. GEORGE PALMER ANONYMOUS Oil on canvas, 30 x 25 Marine Midland Bank

George Palmer is one of the principal organizers of the Marine Midland Bank and its first president.

7. GENERAL PETER B. PORTER, c. 1820 ANONYMOUS Oil on canvas, 35 x 27 Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Jerauld


Peter Buell Porter (1773-1844) was born in Salisbury, CT, graduated from Yale 1791, elected to the House of Representatives from WNY 1808-14. An advocate of the War of 1812, he participated in the battles of Chippewa, Fort Erie and Lundy's Lane. Appointed to U.S.-Canadian Boundary commission 1814. Gov. DeWitt Clinton named him commissioner of the Erie Canal, 1819. Secretary of War under Pres. Madison. He lived at Black Rock, Buffalo until 1836 when he moved to Niagara Falls and bought Goat Island.

8. COLONEL PETER A. PORTER, c. 1860's
ANONYMOUS (Attributed to George P.A. Healy)

Jarvis Coffin

Born in Black Rock in 1827, the son of Gen. Porter (see entry 7). Attended Harvard in 1845 and universities in Heidelberg and Breslan, Germany in 1849. Managed several large land holdings in Buffalo and Niagara Falls. Appointed Colonel in the Civil War and commanded the first regiment of New York Heavy Artillery. Killed while leading his command against the Confederates at the Battle of Cold Harbor, VA, June 3, 1864.


9. MAYOR HIRAM PRATT ANONYMOUS Oil on canvas, 28 x 20 Buffalo City Hall

Hiram Pratt started his career as a merchant when Dr. Cyrenius Chapin asked him to become his partner for a general merchandise store. The business expanded and Pratt was described by his contemporaries as "extensively engaged in commercial enterprises." A Whig, he became Buffalo's fourth Mayor in 1835, serving a one year term, and was re-elected in 1839.









10. SAM, 1955 CHARLOTTE ALBRIGHT Oil on canvas, 29½ x 24½ Lent by the artist

The sitter is a relative of the artist.

11. WILLIAM GRATWICK, c. 1973-76 CHARLES ARNOLD Xerography, 9½ x 11½ William Gratwick

William Gratwick of Pavilion, NY is an artist whose sculpture has inspired poetry by William Carlos Williams. He said there were three major influences in his formative years: "Charles Hopkinson, one of his teachers; Professor A.P. Sanders, who taught him about tree peonies; and Gordon Washburn." Among his other accomplishments, Gratwick is the librettist for three children's operas, internationally acclaimed hybridizer of rare tree peonies and author of a recent book of "autobiographical fiction," The Truth, Tall Tales, and Blatant Lies. Arnold is professor of art and photography at Rochester Institute of Technology. The technique of xerography involves a half-minute direct exposure, resulting in an image like a finely detailed etching.

12. SEYMOUR H. KNOX, JR., 1972 GEORGE AUGUSTA Oil on canvas, 40 x 30 Marine Midland Bank

A native Buffalonian, Seymour H. Knox, Jr. has been an important part of the business and cultural communities of Buffalo. By 1927 he was the Director of F.W. Woolworth Co. and Marine Midland Bank, which he helped to expand from its western division to statewide status, and Chairman of the Board of Marine Midland-Western. He served on these boards for almost fifty years. He was Chairman, University of Buffalo/SUNYAB Council 1949-68. President of the Buffalo Fine Arts Academy for 39 years, he also chaired other art-related boards. Mr. Knox has always been a patron of the arts and in 1962 the Albright Art Gallery was renamed to honor his many contributions to the museum. This portrait was commissioned through Portraits, Inc., NYC.

13. PORTRAIT OF MRS. CHARLES CARY, c. 1925
FLORENCE JULIA BACH

Evelyn Rumsey Cary, WNY artist, designed the Pan-American Exposition poster. Wife of Dr. Charles Cary and sister of Lawrence Rumsey, she was also very active in the SPCA. Florence Julia Bach (1887-1979) was educated both here and in Europe. A teacher at the Buffalo Fine Arts Academy for 29 years, she exhibited primarily in NYC.

14. BOB, AGE 5, 1923 HOWARD BEACH Colored photograph, 35½ x 23¾ Mrs. Robert B. Adam

The subject is Robert B. Adam, civic leader, owner of Adam Meldrum & Anderson's, and a former Chairman of the Board to Children's Hospital. Beach, WNY photographer, was publisher of the magazine *Through the Lens*.

15. TO PHYLLIS – FROM HER FATHER, 1911 RAPHAEL BECK Oil on canvas, 32½ x 22½ Mr. and Mrs. Richard Shotell

This is a portrait of the artist's daughter, Phyllis Beck Van De Mark. Raphael Beck (1858-1947) maintained a studio on Buffalo's West Chippewa Street for many years where he produced seascapes, landscapes and portraits. He is perhaps best known as the designer of the commemorative seal of the Pan-American Exposition held in Buffalo in 1901.

16. ADELBERT MOOT, 1952 FRANK C. BENSING Oil on canvas, 36 x 30

Archives, E.H. Butler Library, State University College at Buffalo

Adelbert Moot served on the law faculty at the University of Buffalo and was a former president, NYS Bar Association. An active leader in Buffalo civic affairs, he became Vice Chancellor of the State Board of Regents. Regent Moot was best known for his influence in creating the Buffalo State Teachers College (now SUC at Buffalo), changing its status from a normal school to a college.

17. PORTRAIT OF GEORGE K. BIRGE, 1913 GERALD BERRY

Lockwood Memorial Library, State University of New York at Buffalo.

George is the son of Martin H. Birge, founder of Birge Wallpaper & Company, and President of the company 1888-1918. The oldest wallpaper manufacturer in America, The Birge Company, Inc. later employed Charles Burchfield as a designer. Birge was also President of Pierce Arrow Motorcar Company 1908-16, as well as one of its founders.





18. PORTRAIT OF MRS. MABEL DODGE AND SON, c. 1908-13
JACQUES-EMILE BLANCHE

The only child of a prominent Buffalo family, Mabel became one of the leading socialites and literary and artistic figures of her day. Her European and New York salons drew many notable writers such as Gertrude Stein, James Joyce and Ernest Hemingway. Through her friendship with Georgia O'Keefe she met D.H. Lawrence and several American avant-garde artists. Blanche was a fashionable society painter.

19. PORTRAIT OF GEORGE CARY, 1887 GASTON CHARPENTIER BOSCH Oil on canvas, 39 x 31½ Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cary

George Cary (1859-1945), architect and artist, was a graduate of Harvard, Columbia School of Architecture and Ecole des Beaux Arts. He designed the Buffalo Historical Society building (the only permanent structure of the 1901 Pan-American Exposition) as well as many other public buildings and private residences in the U.S.

20. HANSON A. RISLEY, 1851 ALVAH BRADISH Oil on canvas, 30 x 35 Historical Museum of the Darwin R. Barker Library, Fredonia, NY

Hanson Risley (1814-93), graduate of Fredonia Academy and Hamilton College, studied law with Judge James Mullett. He practiced law in Dunkirk, served as Chautauqua County clerk and was clerk of the Assembly, Albany, 1860. During the Civil War his friendship with Secretary of State William Seward led to positions in Washington, DC including assistant solicitor of the Treasurer. Bradish (1806-1901) lived in Fredonia, NY and was an active portrait painter in WNY during the mid-1800's. He painted over 500 portraits including such notables as Millard Fillmore and the Civil War naval hero, Lt. William B. Cushing. He was the only artist to paint a full-length portrait of Washington Irving before the author's death.

21. JESSIE M. GLISAN TIFFANY, c. 1858-60 ALVAH BRADISH Oil on canvas, 35½ x 30½

Historical Museum of the Darwin R. Barker Library, Fredonia, NY

Miss Tiffany (1850-76) was the daughter-in-law of a Fredonia businessman.

22. CARTESIAN INVENTION, 1980
HARVEY BREVERMAN
Pastel, sanguine conté crayon with wash, 48 x 38
Lent by the artist

This is a double-portrait composite. From the back, seated, is Harrison G. Swados (deceased 1980), owner and President of Buffalo Batt & Felt Corp. Depicted in the mirror is a three-quarter view of the artist; in Buffalo since 1961. Breverman states that this composite is a carefully orchestrated invention. Poetry rather than exactitude is this artist's intention.

23. STUDY OF PETER, 1976 HARVEY BREVERMAN Pastel, 29 x 41 Lent by the artist

Peter V.R. Lapey, Buffalo Insurance Company executive, sits in one of his vintage automobiles. The portrait is drawn from life at the subject's home on Grand Island one summer afternoon in 1976. Breverman, a faculty member of the SUNYAB art department, has had many exhibitions nationwide.


24. EDWARD BRIDGEMAN AND HIS SISTER EMMA ELIZABETH BRIDGEMAN, 1881

Emma Elizabeth Bridgeman, Mrs. Jewett's grandmother, was a resident of Buffalo in the early 1900's. The artist was a Toronto portrait painter, world traveller, Commodore of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club and teacher at New York Art Student's League.

25. PORTRAIT OF MRS. JOHN J. ALBRIGHT AND CHILDREN, 1902
GEORGE DeFOREST BRUSH

The Albrights reportedly met Brush at the Pan-American Exposition in 1901. The following summer they visited him at his studio in NH where this portrait was painted. The three children featured are Elizabeth, John J., Jr., and Fuller. Brush (1855-1941) was best known for both mother-and-child paintings and Indian scenes. He received his academic training from the French master, Gérôme.

Elbert Hubbard (1856-1915) moved to East Aurora in 1884 and soon founded "The Roycroft," an artistic community. His simple philosophy was to create a haven for artists and craftsmen where they could live and work in a peaceful, rural environment. Both a writer and an artist, Hubbard established himself as a publisher whose works followed in the tradition of William Morris. The Roycroft continues as a center of artistic activities today. Connor, a young sculptor working in Salem, MA, was discovered by Hubbard in 1898. He set up a studio at The Roycroft where he worked in iron, ceramics and stone. Working under the name, "St. Jerome," he produced busts of Hubbard, William Morris, Walt Whitman, Richard Wagner and Hamlet.

Medical School, and diplomat of the American Board of Internal Medicine. He wore a fresh carnation in his lapel every day, as he said, "In memory of my Mother." Virginia Cuthbert (b. 1908), artist, teacher and recipient of an American Academy of Arts and Letters grant, has exhibited nationally. She is married to artist Philip Elliott.

David Clarkson graduated from Park School, Buffalo as president of the upper school, cited as "Scholar-Athlete" when graduated from Hobart College, and is presently enrolled in the graduate program, Boston College.

Lawyer and patron of the arts, Mr. Millonzi's national achievements include: Commissioner of the Securities and Exchange Commission and member of the Board of Trustees, Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Locally he is the recent chairman, Council of Trustees of SUNYAB; former chairman, Buffalo Foundation; and chairman, Board of Directors of the Buffalo Philharmonic Society.

41. ALBERTINE HOYT GLENNY, II, 1939 EDWIN DICKINSON Oil on canvas, 273/4 x 221/2 Mrs. James Croft

Both the Hoyt and Glenny families were great friends with Dickinson. This portrait, painted in an orchard, shows the influence of WNY environment on the artist. Edwin Dickinson grew up in Buffalo and first studied art with Urquhart Wilcox at the Art School of Buffalo Fine Arts Academy. He furthered his studies in NYC with William Merritt Chase and Frank V. DuMond, but Charles Hawthorne, from whom he took summer painting lessons in Provincetown, was his most influential mentor. Dickinson taught and painted in France and the East Mediterranean. His work is included in the permanent collections of major museums.

Dickinson's first commissioned portrait features William and Esther Sawyer. Mrs. Ansley Sawyer, better known as Esther Hoyt Sawyer, the artist, was the children's mother. The continuous support of Esther and Ansley contributed greatly to advancing Edwin's career; they were responsible for bringing him back to Buffalo time and again to paint, teach and exhibit.

Katharine Cornell, born in Buffalo, was an accomplished actress. This bust was executed in Buffalo and exists in at least three casts, of which this is the model. Anna Glenny Dunbar, also born and educated in Buffalo, studied sculpture at the School of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and in Paris with Antoine Bourdell, 1909-11.



The subject is a WNY artist exhibiting both nationally and internationally since 1949. Her work is non-representational, focusing on modulations of color and texture. Grigoriev was a well-known Russian painter in the 20's and 30's. In 1927 he had an exhibition of his paintings at the "Barnstable Studio," home of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey Hamlin (see entry 88).

Fillmore Ricard, 78 years of age, lives on the Tuscarora Reservation in Niagara Falls, NY, which is part of the Iroquois Six Nations. The child is his great-grandson, Levi. Harding, from Newfane, has taught art courses for grade school children at the Barge Canal Art Center in Middleport, NY. Besides painting he is employed as an apprentice cabinet maker learning the fine art of restoring antique furniture.

This portrait was probably done after a daguerreotype. Charles Hawthorne (1872-1930), founder of the Cape Cod School of Art, was one of America's most respected artists in the early 20th century.

Ann, an expert equestrian, is shown with her horse named "Not Again." Helder is a prominent Michigan portrait painter of both people and horses.

This portrait of Red Jacket is a copy made by Thomas Hicks in November, 1867, from a portrait painted by R.W. Wier in 1828. The Wier likeness of the Seneca Indian leader is one that has been used as the basis for portraits in various media; and as a result it is a pose that has become familiar to us. Tradition tells us that Sa-go-ye-wat-ha became known as Red Jacket during the time of the Revolution because he had been given a red coat by the British when he had served as a dispatch bearer. He developed the reputation as an orator and the place he holds in WNY history is an important one.





Thomas B. Lockwood (1873-1947) was known as "an attorney by profession but a litterateur by devotion." He served as trustee of the Grosvenor Library, the State Teachers College, the Buffalo Seminary, the J.N. Adam Memorial Hospital, the Historical Society and the University of Buffalo. His greatest contribution, however, was to the University as its most generous benefactor. He and his late wife, Marion Birge Lockwood, gave a priceless collection of rare books, a magnificent building in which to house them and an endowment for collection maintenance. With these gifts UB established one of the nation's leading university libraries. Augustus John (1878-1961) was an English painter of portraits, figures, landscapes, still lifes and murals, and member of the Royal Academy. He travelled throughout Europe and visited the U.S. His style is described as a compromise between the poetic sentiment of the Pre-Raphaelites and the technique of the Impressionists.





In 1840 Sheldon Thompson, a Whig, was the first elected Mayor of Buffalo. Born in Owego, NY, Thomas LeClear (1818-82) travelled in central and WNY as an itinerant portraitist before establishing himself in both NYC and Buffalo as a major talent. In 1862 he helped to organize Buffalo Fine Arts Academy and secure its initial collection. He is also well-known as a genre painter.

Dr. Samuel Paul Capen (1878-1956) was Chancellor of the University of Buffalo 1922 to 1950. Under his leadership the University grew in stature to become an outstanding institution known for its liberalism and academic freedom. Wyndham Lewis (1884-1957) was an English painter, illustrator, art critic and journalist. In 1914 he was a part of the Vorticism movement and in his writings defined the vortex as the maximum point of energy. After WWI he led English painting to the frontiers of constructivist abstraction by creating constructions around the vertical combined with an impersonal, almost metallic, aspect to the surfaces. Both Futurism and Cubism influenced his work. Lewis is considered the founder of modern English painting and an important part of the movement towards modernism as seen in the early 1900's.

McNulty convinced the artist to come to the U.S. Several Buffalonian portraits are the result, including this one done when the Wettlaufer family was vacationing in Canada.

Paul A. Schoellkopf, II is Chairman of the Board, Niagara Shares. Lober, a New York sculptor, was a member of the National Sculptors' Society; The Architectural League; Salmagundi Club; Allied Artists; and teacher at Connecticut Academy of Fine Arts. His work is represented in permanent collections of many of the country's museums.

An aunt of the artist, the sitter was a well-known artist in the late 19th century (see entry 13). A native Buffalonian, Evelyn Rumsey Lord (1877-1963) studied with Charles Woodbury, Charles Hawthorne and Urquhart Wilcox. Her studio on Tracy Place was popularized by local artists.

A public spirited person and Red Cross volunteer, Maria Maltby Love (1840-1931) founded Fitch Crèche Nursery, 1880, an early day care center. The Children's Charity Ball was renamed Maria M. Love Charity Ball in her memory.

Mrs. Lord was one of the few NYS artists to be invited to exhibit at the famous New York Armory Show in 1913. It was this portrait that she exhibited.

Major Andrews settled in Buffalo about 1820. A lawyer, he served on several committees for Buffalo's first Mayor, Ebenezer Johnson. In 1833 he became Buffalo's second Mayor, serving the traditional one year term.

E.H. Butler founded Buffalo Evening News in 1880. He was President, local Board of Buffalo Normal School (now SUCB) and was involved with numerous civic affairs. Three generations of the Butler family, including Edward H. Butler, Sr., Edward H. Butler, Jr., and Kate Butler Wallis have given the State University College at Buffalo eighty-four years of service. Malloney was a well-known Toronto artist.


Trumbull Cary (1787-1869) was a key figure in the development of WNY territories. He moved to Batavia, NY in 1808 and worked closely with Joseph Ellicott for the Holland Land Company. He served as Adjutant in the War of 1812, rendered honorable service in both branches of the legislature of NYS and was appointed Bank Commissioner by Gov. William H. Seward. He started the first bank of WNY.

85. REVEREND WILLIAM SHELTON, c. 1855 BENJAMIN FRANKLIN MASON Oil on canvas, 35½ x 28¼ St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral

Rev. Shelton (1798-1883) was rector of St. Paul's for 52 years and builder of the cathedral, completed in 1850, which now serves as the principal church of the Episcopal Diocese of WNY. Journeyman artist Mason (1804-71) worked in Buffalo 1855-57. His studio was the old Claredon Hotel, located on the north-east corner of Main and Division Streets. Curiously, this portrait, found in St. Paul's parish house basement in 1976, is the only Buffalo area painting by Mason thus far uncovered. It is possible that other Mason canvases still exist in Buffalo homes.

Grace McKendry is a WNY artist teaching at Nichols School, Buffalo. About the portrayal of women in her art she states: "The inner landscapes of women are important to me – their struggles, their emotions, their circumstances at this moment."

The sitter is the artist's mother. From Buffalo, Arnold Mesches aims to bring out his subject's personality by focusing on a distinctive facial expression and slightly exaggerating the patterns produced by glaring light. His 1970's work involves "brushstroke triangulation" whereby the surface is composed of a myriad of triangles that converge to form the face. In this way the tightly cropped portraits are both abstract and faithful to the sitter.

Our present Buffalo Museum of Science is the creation of Chauncey Jerome Hamlin, who single-mindedly persevered in a campaign to erect a permanent museum building and obtain financial security for the upkeep of exhibits. After the museum opening in 1929 he served as its President until 1948. Among his accomplishments, he served as President of the American Association of Museums and helped found the International Council of Museums.

One of the major flutists in the roster of today's artists, Carol was born and educated in Buffalo. She is the recipient of numerous European and American awards.

Mitchell is a prominent NYC photographer of celebrities whose work appears in *The New York Times, Dance Magazine, Art News, Time* and *Newsweek*.

90. BUST OF A. CONGER GOODYEAR, 1933 ISAMU NOGUCHI Terra cotta, 14 x 91/4 x 91/4 Albright-Knox Art Gallery

A. Conger Goodyear lived in Buffalo and served as a member of the Board of Directors, Buffalo Fine Arts Academy for two terms: 1912-14 and 1916-28. He later moved to NYC where he was a founder of the Museum of Modern Art and its first President. He was one of the country's leading private collectors of modern European art.

Noguchi, born in CA in 1904, is an internationally recognized sculptor with a wide range of interests. Brancusi was a strong influence as well as Surrealism and Japanese art. He has worked for both public and private sectors, producing works that vary from mammoth to intimate.

91. ELIZABETH SWADOS FREDERICK OHRINGER Photograph, 10 x 8 Robert O. Swados

Born and educated in Buffalo, Elizabeth Swados is a theatrical composer, writer, director and choreographer of several Lincoln Center productions, Broadway and off-Broadway shows. She is the winner of Obie Awards and recipient of Tony Award nominations.

Sharon Guinta is a noted fashion and television model, teacher and fashion consultant for WNY stores. She has appeared in numerous local and national television commercials. George Palmer has been painting portraits of WNYers for over twenty years.

A portrait of the artist's wife, this bust received a CAPS award. Tony Paterson, Associate Professor of Art, SUNYAB, is winner of National Academy of Design Award, 1969. He states: "For me portraiture is the ultimate challenge because first and foremost it has to survive as a piece of sculpture."

94. PHILIP ELLIOTT, 1976 ANTHONY R. PATERSON Bronze, 14½ x 11 x 12 Lent by the artist

This portrait was commissioned by the Art Department, SUNYAB, for presentation to Philip Elliott upon his retirement from the department in 1977.

95. MAJOR ANDREW ELLICOTT, c. 1802 RAPHAELLE PEALE Oil miniature, 31/4 x 21/2 Mr. and Mrs. James Carey Evans

Andrew Ellicott (1754-1820), Surveyor General of the U.S. in 1797, laid out the City of Washington with the assistance of his younger brother, Joseph (see entry 137). He worked with George Washington and headed an army unit that defeated the Spaniards at Natches. Raphaelle Peale (1774-1825), the son of famous American painter Charles Willson Peale, is one of the children of a family of artists. His specialty was still lifes done in a highly realistic, *trompe l'oeil* manner. The Museum of Fine Arts, Boston owns an identical portrait, signed and dated 1801.

Dorothy Hill Gurney is co-manager of Trinity Center, Trinity Episcopal Church, Buffalo. A prominent portrait painter of Buffalo society, Margaret (1888-1973) was married to Irving L. Price, co-founder of Fisher-Price Toy Company. She contributed designs for several of their early toys and she wrote and illustrated children's books.

Mrs. Jewett is well known for leadership in Buffalo's International Institute, Visiting Nursing Association and General Hospital.

The subject is Mrs. Norton Willcox. Born in Buffalo, Prochownik spent his childhood in Poland. In 1940 he returned to the U.S. and studied at the Art Institute of Buffalo and The Art Student's League of N.Y. Recipient of several honors and awards, the artist's diverse work is in many national collections. Erie County Rath Building features his mural.

Henry W. Rogers was a prominent Buffalo citizen, a lawyer by profession. He served as Collector of the Port; President, Water Works Company; and President, Academy of Fine Arts for two terms: 1862-64 and 1869-70. Rinehart (1825-74) is an important 19th century American sculptor of the Classical style. He maintained a studio in Italy most of his life, but usually produced works for a prosperous American clientele.

103. PORTRAIT OF MILLARD FILLMORE **AUGUSTUS ROCKWELL**

Millard Fillmore, the thirteenth President of the U.S., 1850-54, was born in Moravia, NY in 1800. He and his wife lived in East Aurora 1826-30. After his Presidency Fillmore came back to Buffalo and lived on Niagara Square and Delaware Avenue. He was instrumental in founding and supporting Buffalo Fine Arts Academy, Young Men's Association, and General Hospital. He died in Buffalo in 1874. Augustus Rockwell (1822-82) was born in Manlius, NY, came to Buffalo in 1852 and became a successful portrait and landscape painter.

Milton Rogovin has lived in Buffalo since 1938. He received degrees from Columbia University, B.S. Optics & Optometry, 1931; and SUNYAB, M.A. American Studies, 1972. His portfolios have been published in over 38 periodicals and books since 1961.

Re: Cary (see entry 1). Augustus St. Gaudens (1848-1907) established himself as America's greatest sculptor during The Gilded Era. He earned enough money as a young man cutting cameos to go abroad to study sculpture. His heroic public monuments include NYC's equestrian General Sherman, Chicago's standing Lincoln, and Washington's Adams Memorial. Many of his smaller, more intimate portrait reliefs reside in the National Portrait Gallery.

107. THE SIMON CHILDREN, 1922 OTTO H. SCHNEIDER Oil on canvas, 60½ x 47 Mrs. John W. Buyers

Represented are William K., Florence Louise (Mrs. Paul Sullivan, now deceased) and Marjorie (Mrs. John W. Buyers): the grandchildren of William J. Simon, founder of the William Simon Brewery of Buffalo, late 1800's.

108. JUDGE SEARS, 1940 PAUL SECKEL Oil on canvas, 39½ x 47 International Institute, Inc.

Judge Sears was the first President, Board of Directors, International Institute when it was incorporated in 1934. Seckel was a young German immigrant when he painted this portrait.

109. GROVER CLEVELAND LARS SELLSTEDT Oil on canvas, 41 x 31 The Buffalo Club

Lars Sellstedt (1819-1911) was born in Sweden, spent his early life as a sailor on the ocean and Great Lakes. In 1842 he moved to Buffalo and became an American citizen. He established himself as a professional artist, self-taught, by the time he was in his late twenties, and debuted at the National Academy in 1858. With his friend, Thomas LeClear, he helped found The Buffalo Fine Arts Academy in 1862, and served as its President 1876-77.

110. MAYOR GEORGE W. CLINTON, 1899 LARS SELLSTEDT Oil on canvas, 35 x 28 Buffalo City Hall

George W. Clinton, a Democrat, served Buffalo as Mayor 1842-43. He continued his career as a Judge 1854-77. During that time he was instrumental to many organizations, being chosen 2nd Vice-President, Board of Directors to establish Buffalo General Hospital, 1846; commissioned to organize the Historical Society, 1862; and President, Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences, 1863.

111. LOUISE, 1956 MADAME ELIZABETH SHOUMATOFF Gouache, 26½ x 22 Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. Stevenson

Louise now has her doctorate in American Studies and is the wife of Philip D. Zimmerman, Curator, Currier Museum of Fine Art. Madame Shoumatoff (1888-1980) was a Russianborn portraitist who came to national attention in 1945 when Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt, whose portrait she was painting, was stricken during a sitting. She is also well known for her official portrait of Pres. Lyndon Johnson who commissioned her after he rejected another artist's portrait. Her likeness was used for the Johnson commemorative postage stamp issued after his death in 1973.



This portrait of Phil Muscato won first prize in the 1947 Buffalo Society of Artists exhibition, juried by Charles Burchfield. Tony Sisti is known as a boxer, artist, art collector and promotor of the arts. He moved to Buffalo from the Bronx when he was 10. By earning enough money boxing and driving his uncle's truck he financed a trip to Europe for art lessons. During the depression he painted WPA murals in the children's auditorium of Buffalo's City Hospital. He organized the first Allentown Arts Festival, 1956, thus establishing it as a favorite neighborhood event. A friend of Charles Burchfield, and an avid collector of Burchfield's work, it is no surprise that Sisti is one of the Burchfield Center's major patrons.

The sitter, whose maiden name was Emilie Victorine Mitchell, was known as a great beauty and fine hostess. This portrait survived a fire in 1973 when major portions of the main house burned down. Sorolla (1863-1923), a Spaniard, painted society portraits while he resided in Buffalo. The Sorolla Museum in Madrid features his seascapes. He is renowned for his luminist techniques.

Rebecca, the artist's sister, posed for this portrait the year before he came to Buffalo. Born in Russia in 1907, Isaac Soyer came to America in 1914. He studied art in NYC and with his brothers Raphael and Moses was instrumental in founding the "14th Street School" of social realists. In 1941 Soyer left NYC to join the faculty of the Albright Art School, where he taught for several years.

119. PORTRAIT OF COLONEL CHARLES CLIFTON, 1923 EUGENE SPEICHER Oil on canvas, 50 x 40 Albright-Knox Art Gallery

This portrait was commissioned by the Board of Directors, Buffalo Fine Arts Academy in 1923 to honor Clifton who had been a member since 1914, and then its President 1918-28. Eugene Speicher (1883-1962), a native of Buffalo, started his art education at the Albright Art School before moving to NYC in 1906 for further studies. He resided in WNY and painted several of its citizens during his life.

120. KATHARINE CORNELL AS "CANDIDA," 1925-26 EUGENE SPEICHER Oil on canvas over wood panel, 841/4 x 451/4 Albright-Knox Art Gallery

This most celebrated portrait of Miss Cornell illustrates her in the title role of George Bernard Shaw's play during its success in NYC. It was originally commissioned by A. Conger Goodyear to honor the actress whose roots are in Buffalo.

One of Speicher's favorite models, Vincent "Red" Moore appears in many of his drawings and paintings. Moore was a farmer in Woodstock, NY where Speicher kept a summer residence from 1910. Speicher was one of the founders of the Woodstock art colony.

WNY artist Ellen Steinfeld, educated at Carnegie-Mellon University and University of Pittsburgh, has travelled extensively throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe working with such artists as Mary Frank, Margie Hughto and Kenneth Noland. Since 1968 she has participated in numerous national solo and group exhibitions.

John Joseph Albright was President of the Buffalo Fine Arts Academy 1895-97 and in 1905 donated the building for the Albright Art Gallery. He is shown here seated in his library with books and paintings including one at the right of the Art Gallery. Edmund Charles Tarbell was one of the best known portrait painters in America at this time. He studied in Paris and in 1889 helped found the group, "The Ten."

A. Conger Goodyear was founder of the Museum of Modern Art in NYC (see entry 90).

He was involved in battles at Chippewa and Fort Erie. This and the painting of his wife, both done from life at Niagara Falls, are among the earliest examples of portraiture in this area.




James Wadsworth (1768-1844) came to Geneseo in 1790 where he planned and developed an ideally balanced community. An educator as well, he has been called "Father of the New York public school system." John Trumbull (1756-1843) is recognized as one of America's greatest painters. After his involvement in the Revolutionary War he travelled from NH to SC portraying the notables of his period.

137. PORTRAIT OF JOSEPH ELLICOTT ABRAHAM G.D. TUTHILL Oil on canvas, 28 x 24 Holland Land Office Museum

Joseph Ellicott (1760-1826) accumulated experience as a land surveyor for the Holland Land Company by surveying their tract in PA and in 1797 assisting his brother, Andrew (then Surveyor-General of the U.S.) in surveying Washington and planning the layout of the Capitol city. He first fell in love with the Buffalo region in 1788 and consistently pursued the research and development of this area. In 1798 he had his start as General-in-Chief of the grand surveying campaign for an extensive block of land west of the Genesee River to Erie and south into PA. He founded the City of Buffalo, selecting the site and providing the ground plans. Benevolent in selling land to homesteaders, he often freely lent money and land after the War of 1812. He was a strong advocate of the Erie Canal from its inception in 1808 to its completion in 1825. Nearing retirement he planned to build a home in the city, but was deeply grieved when Buffalo officials denied his plans and cut the plot in half with North and South Division Streets. Consequently he built a mansion in Batavia, having little to do with Buffalo thereafter.

Col. Blossom (1789-1858) settled in Buffalo in 1825 and married Eunice Hubbard in 1828. He was the Buffalo agent for the Holland Land Company. He was Alderman for the Third Ward in 1832 and 1835, and served on three mayoral committees. Samuel Bell Waugh (1814-55) was a portraitist of some renown who lived in Buffalo in 1835.

Born in Los Angeles in 1942, Paul Wiesenfeld has studied and exhibited in Munich, NYC, and various cities in the U.S. He taught painting at SUC at Buffalo, 1969-73.

Mrs. Cary (1827-1915) is a member of one of the first families of Buffalo. Her father was Thomas Cutting Love, congressman and surrogate of Erie County. She married Dr. Walter Cary, and they had seven children including Dr. Charles Cary and Architect George Cary. Urquhart Wilcox came to Buffalo in 1904 as instructor of drawing at the Buffalo School of Fine Arts. As a teacher he was responsible for the early development of the notable painters Eugene Speicher and Edwin Dickinson. Eventually he served as Director of the school.

141. WALTER P. COOKE URQUHART WILCOX Oil on canvas, 35½ x 25½ Marine Midland Bank

Walter P. Cooke was Chairman of Marine Midland Bank for two terms, 1919-25 and 1928-31.

142. LITTLE GIRL WITH BLOCKS, 1918-19 URQUHART WILCOX Oil on canvas, 36 x 36 Mr. and Mrs. James M. Carter

The artist was the uncle of the subject, Nancy Russell, now Mrs. James M. Carter. She is known in WNY for her dedicated work with the blind and handicapped. "My father was pleased to have this portrait when he came home after WWI in 1919. He had missed part of my growing up."

143. PORTRAIT OF ROSWELL PARK, c. 1905 URQUHART WILCOX Oil on canvas, 30 x 24½ Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society

Dr. Park (1852-1914), longtime resident of Buffalo, became a professor of surgery at UB and was an early medical pioneer in the study and treatment of cancer. Through his contributions, the internationally known Roswell Park Medical Center was developed. Park was one of the four surgeons who worked to save President William McKinley's life in 1901.
